

# HOW TO BLOW ICE BUBBLES



Blowing ice bubbles is a wonderful experiment to do with the kids, and the beautiful crystalline patterns that form on the bubbles is an experience not soon forgotten.

If you live in a climate that has cold winters, you can blow soap bubbles outside and watch them crystallize. The patterns they make as they freeze are beautiful, but unfortunately, they do not last long. Under the right conditions, however, ice bubbles are an amazing experiment to try. Temperatures need to be below minus 5 degrees Fahrenheit or minus 7 degrees Celsius. Blow your bubbles up high into the air to give them ample time to freeze.

## **MIX TOGETHER:**

- 3 cups water
- 1 cup liquid dishwashing detergent
- 1/2 cup white corn syrup (for stronger, bigger bubbles)
